A Message from Pastor Jason

Don't you enjoy getting good news? I do because in our world there's an abundance of negativity. Turn on the TV. Read the newspaper. Look at social media. There's a steady dosage of depressing information bombarding us. I'm tired of it! I want some good news hot off the press... news that is life changing not life draining.

The Hebrew people at the time of Jesus' birth were in desperate need for good news as well. They were politically, socially, and religiously oppressed. The Roman Empire was ruling over them with an iron fist and socially enticing them with a hedonistic lifestyle. The Hebrews were also religiously pressured by a polytheistic culture and weary from the demands of the Law. The Hebrew people at the time of Jesus' birth were required to address their own sin; they were still required to offer sacrifices in the temple on a regular basis as payment for their sins.

Imagine the pressure of having to clean up your own spiritual mess every year in an effort to make yourself right with God! It was an impossible task! So yes... the Hebrew people were in a state of despondency and needed some good news. So God delivers, Matthew writes, and every person who has read or reads his gospel, and in particular, *Matthew 1:18-25*, is given the best news ever and it comes in the form of a baby!

An angel appeared to Joseph and told him to name this Mary's baby *Jesus*, and Joseph did! The name Jesus comes from the Hebrew word Yeshua/Joshua, which means *savior*. The angel of the Lord appeared to Joseph and told him to give Mary's baby the name "Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins."

Well, the ramifications of this are amazing! Jesus, will save his people from their sins, which means he will cleanse people and restore the severed relationship between humanity and God that was the result of sin, which means no more sacrificing in the future, no more lambs or doves will have to be offered up in the Temple as payment for the debt of sin people owe. Jesus, will take his people's sin away; he will bring healing and wholeness. His tiny hands will one day be pierced for their transgressions. His tender brow will one day be crushed by a crown of thorns for their sins. His fragile side will one day be speared for their iniquities. His little heart's blood will one day be spilled for their sake. This baby is Jesus, for he "will save his people from their sins."

Good News! Read All About It!



This baby is also the *Messiah*. In the beginning of this passage, when Matthew first refers to this baby as Christ; he's talking about the Messiah, the one who is the complete fulfillment of all Old Testament prophecy. Messiah is the Jewish term Matthew uses to describe this baby as the royal Son of David and the rightful King of Israel. But Matthew's use of the word Messiah is even broader than this. In Matthew 16:16 the Jewish title of Messiah is linked with a Greco-Roman title. In that verse, Jesus is, "The Messiah, the Son of the Living God."

The title Son of the Living God was a Roman title given to Octavian; the Bible refers to him as Caesar Augustus. After Julius Caesar died, many of his followers deified him. So since Caesar Augustus was Julius Caesar's adopted son, people called Caesar Augustus, the Son of the Living God. When Matthew uses this title in chapter 16 to describe the Messiah, he's purposefully telling his audience that Jesus Messiah is not only the rightful King of Israel, but he's the real Son of the real Living God, which makes this Messiah the King of Kings and the King of all, especially King over all power hungry, oppressive, arrogant, delusional, despotic emperors and their empires. This baby is Jesus Messiah, the King of Israel, and the King of Kings.

Matthew also tells us that this baby, Jesus Messiah, has yet another name, *Emmanuel*, which means *God with us*. Emmanuel took on flesh and blood; the Word became flesh and lived among us (John 1:14). God entered time and space, became a man, and lived with humanity. Emmanuel was born for us, to live for us

and to die for us. to suffer for us and to suffer alongside us. Emmanuel is fully God and fully Human. Because he's fully human, he understands our pain and because he's fully God, he brings divine comfort to those in pain. Emmanuel is not some aloof and pretentious King confined to an ivory tower in a kingdom far, far, away. He is Emmanuel, always with us, always present.



And this baby is exactly what humanity needed. He's exactly who we needed. What humanity needed was someone no ordinary human being could ever be or offer. We needed someone who could save us from our sins, rule over us with his love, and identify with us in times of suffering; and we received exactly what we needed (exactly who we needed) in Jesus Messiah Emmanuel. The single greatest news in existence is wrapped up in this baby boy. So, the main question for you today is: Have you embraced the good news found in Jesus Messiah Emmanuel AND have you placed your life in his saving, royal, divine arms?
